

Miss Emily Butcher Gets Degree From Columbia University

Reports reaching here from the United States during the past week indicate that Miss Emily Elvira Butcher, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John O. Butcher of La Boca, Canal Zone, was among the 7,995 graduates upon whom degrees were conferred this month at the 194th annual commencement exercises of the Columbia University in New York City.

Miss Butcher, a graduate of the first class of the La Boca Normal Training School, a graduate of the Instituto Pan-Americano and an alumna of the National Conservatory of Panama, up until her departure from

these shores nearly two years ago, was employed by the Division of Schools on the Canal Zone in the capacity of special teacher of music in the colored schools. Granted an extensive leave of absence by the Schools Division, she proceeded to the United States where she entered the widely known institution



students were Sadie Springer [died in 1972), Wilfred Callender [died in 2012), Roland Watson+, Maurice Heywood+, Eric Green+, Joscelyn Russell+, Myrtle Kirkaldy+, Phillip Walker+, Claude Clark+, Ruth Miller+, Mabel McLean+, Elsie Hayott+, among others who were all in my class of '48. Those who are still "smelling the roses" from my class are Louis Walker, Gladys Mauge, Milton Clark, Elaine Elliott, Edna Holder, John Evans and Roy Hogan. Also, Luther Franco, Francine Richards, Myrtle Brown who may still be among the living, but I've not been in touch with recently. At a

later date, i'll try to add to this list by class. To the best of my memory, the above mentioned is what I can immediately recall. Old La Boca School was built on a cliff below which the Panama Railroad had a railroad line which connected Balboa through La Boca to Ft. Amador. This position allowed the students of La Boca to view the Breakwater of the Panama Canal at the southern entrance at the mouth of the canal. [For almost 50 years the bigoted, prejudiced US authority (The Metals Trade Union) finally made the CZ Government exchanged La Boca non-US citizens for Pedro Miguel US citizens and vice-versa. Hence, the new La Boca School was converted to the Canal Zone Jr. College while Pedro Miguel became a non US community. While La Boca was a non-US citizens community, the Thatcher Ferry was in operation allowing traffic to cross to the West Bank and to get to the Interior towns of the Rep. of Pma. The residents of La Boca had easy access to Hide Away and Far Fan Beaches on the West Bank. Life in La Boca was pleasurable though, much was done to keep people in abject poverty. Good Luck!



A total of 12 families resided on that building. Some of our neighbors were the Williams: Lunis, Lester, Frankie, Agnes, Felida and Alice. The Hogans: Lloyd, Frankie, Roy, Raymond, Guy, Kenneth, Ilene, Ivy, adie and Monica. The Watsons: Carlos, Junie, Teddy, Shirley, Earl. The Searles: Venicia, Elena, and Virginia, the Jones Rupert, Frankie, Enrique, Clara, May and Mary. The McKenzies: Freddy and his parents; The Maloneys: Kenneth, Myrtle and Carmen; the Greens: Ashton Cardova and his parents. During the Korean Conflict and the last guarter of 1951, the U.S. Government opened the Draft Board in Balboa, Canal Zone. The Draft was intended for the American Citizens who were residing in the Canal Zone at the time, some of them were born and raised in the Canal Zone and believe it or not some of them spoke Spanish fluently. The American boys weren't able to fill their quota and the local boys (La Boca, Paraiso, Red Tank, Gamboa, Silver City, Gatun, etc.) heard of this draft and saw an opportunity and all decided to signed up for the draft and were accepted. Both of my brothers, Andrew and Kenneth Atherton, were drafted in March 1952 along with other set of brothers, Popey and Twist-up Jordan, Melbourne and Alcides Belgrave. I don't know Popey and Twist-up first names, I only know them as Popey and Twist-up. I have some photographs.
